The best part was that we had 6 plus hours to yak with other club members about all things radio. Anytime that we can spend an afternoon talking radio with friends is an afternoon well spent. Working a lot of stations would have just been icing on the cake! We will try again next year.

# 2006 Field Day Planned for June 24-25

The 2006 ARRL Field Day will take place on June 24 and 25. We will be setting up shop at the 911 Center and will have both outdoor and indoor stations in operation.

Once again the rules allow us to make use of fixed antennas provided that they are in place as part of the Emergency Operating Center. Our Tribander and wire antenna fall into that category, so we are spared the "fun" of erecting those antennas on the spot. This also means that our indoor station is in an air conditioned environment and we have yet to spot a mosquito, gnat, or fly hovering around our operating position.

For those who like to brave the elements, we expect to set up an outdoor station complete with all the flying insects associated with June in Michigan. We will do our best to order moderate, dry weather, but we all understand that our order may be on backorder, so we will have to deal with what mother nature gives us. Bring your jacket, hat, sun blocker and insect repellant just in case!

We expect to be on hand at the 911 Center about noon on Saturday, June 24 to get things set up and plan to make the first radio transmissions at 2:00 pm when the contest officially begins. We will operate through the night and will be

able to operate up to 2:00 pm on Sunday afternoon.

For those who might be hearing about Field Day for the first time, Field Day is an annual operating event whose purpose is to work as many stations as possible on any and all amateur bands (excluding the 60, 30, 17, and 12-meter bands) and in doing so to learn to operate in abnormal situations in less than optimal conditions. A premium is placed on developing skills to meet the challenges of emergency preparedness as well as to acquaint the general public with the capabilities of Amateur Radio. This gives us a great opportunity to exercise our club station as well as to give us practice setting up a station and antennas from scratch from a makeshift location.

This is a fun event where all hams can get together to have some fun, work some stations on the HF bands (even if you don't have the license to do so on your own!), learn some things about how to operate in less than the best conditions, and spend some serious ham time with your friends.

# Vanity Callsign Fee Proposed to Drop Slightly

Vanity call sign fee poised to drop slightly later this year. The FCC wants to reduce the Fiscal Year 2006 regulatory fee to obtain an Amateur Radio vanity call sign to \$20.10 for the 10-year license term. The current vanity fee is \$21.90. The Commission proposed the new fee in a Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM), "Assessment and Collection of Regulatory Fees for Fiscal Year 2006," in MD Docket 06-68, released March 27. If ordered as proposed, the new vanity fee would become effective in August or September. The FCC is obligated to collect nearly \$289 million in regulatory fees during FY 2006 to fund its operations.

Comments on the proposed fee schedule are due Friday, April 14. Reply comments are due Friday, April 21. The FCC has projected collecting \$171,188 in vanity call sign fee receipts from 8500 applications in FY 2006.

The vanity call sign fee has assumed somewhat greater significance this year as the renewal window is about to open for the first Amateur Radio licenses assigned vanity call signs in 1996. Applicants who wish to keep their post-1995 vanity call signs must pay the vanity call sign regulatory fee in effect at the time the renewal application reaches the FCC. Any Amateur Radio renewal application may only be filed within 90 days of the license expiration date.

Amateur Radio licensees holding vanity call signs granted prior to 1996 do not have to pay a regulatory fee when renewing. This is because Congress did not begin requiring the FCC to annually recover its regulatory costs until 1993. Additionally, such licensees are not specifically tagged as vanity call sign holders in the ULS. (Information courtesy of ARRL)

## House Committee Okays Telecoms Bill with BPL-Interference Study Amendment

NEWINGTON, CT, Apr 27, 2006--The <u>US House</u> Energy and Commerce Committee's version of the Communications

Opportunity, Promotion and Enhancement (COPE) Act of 2006 includes an amendment requiring the FCC to study the interference potential of BPL systems. After spending two days marking up (the Ross amendment is No 25) the measure, the panel voted April 26 to send the much-talkedabout "telecoms rewrite" bill to the full House for its consideration.

"Outstanding news!" was the reaction of ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ.

"This is a major victory for the ARRL," he exulted, noting that the amendment "received significant opposition" from utility companies. Rep Mike Ross, WD5DVR (D-AR), proposed the amendment, and, with the support of Committee Chairman Joe (R-TX), Barton the committee agreed by voice vote to include it in the bill.

A year ago, Ross sponsored House Resolution 230 (H Res 230), which calls on the FCC to "reconsider and revise rules governing broadband over power line

# May 2006 Fox Hunt Rules


- ➤ The hunt will commence from the parking lot of the 911 Center at 7:15 PM.
- ➤ Hunt timeframe will be a maximum of 1 hour 30 minutes
- ➤ The fox will be hidden within a 10-mile radius of the intersection of Marshall and Chicago streets in Coldwater.
- ➤ The Fox will be transmitting on 147.550 MHz.
- ➤ The Fox will transmit for one minute followed by 4 minutes of silence. All transmissions will take place at 5-minute intervals beginning at 7:15, followed by 7:20, 7:25, etc.
- > The Fox may change power settings during the hunt.
- Time synchronization will be available from the Hunt Master prior to the start of the hunt.
- ➤ The hidden antenna will have 5 tags attached to or near it that bear numbers 1 through 5.
- When the Fox is located, the team locating it should <u>not</u> mention anything on the air or otherwise tell others where the fox is located.
- As each team finds the Fox, they should discreetly and quietly take the lowest numbered tag and return to the 911 Center and turn the tag over to the Hunt Master. The Hunt Master will write on the tag the time that the tag was received and sign the tag. If a team finds the Fox and there are no tags present, that means that at least 5 others have found the Fox before them.
- ➤ The person or team with the number 1 tag will be the winner of the hunt. Runners-up will follow the same procedure and be scored according to the numbered tags that they turn into the Hunt Master.
- ➤ Our primary concern during the hunt is for the safety of all participants.











- ➤ We will notify the authorities that we are conducting a hunt.
- ➤ If you drive slowly or stop your car in or near the roadway, remember to turn on your 4-way flashers in your vehicle.
- > Be careful when exiting your car near the flow of traffic.
- > Think safety all the time.

<u>June</u> In June, the focus of our meeting program will be on Field Day, which takes place on June 24 and 25. Old pictures and newspaper clippings will be part of the show and will be sure to rev you up for this year's Field Day!

<u>July</u> In July, our friends from the Ft. Wayne DX Association, Carl, K9LA and Vicky, AE9YL will join us. Carl will compare and contrast ham radio of 1926 with the current state of the art. This will be a program that you will not want to miss!
